Internal Data Overview

 Divisional dashboards aim to streamline programmatic data reporting processes and increase data visibility among sections.

• Enable commonly reported divisional data and indicators to be readily available for programmatic staff, FCPH leadership, and serve as an agency resource for all staff.



External Data



External Data Overview

- The Franklin County Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Evaluation System (CARES) was developed by FCPH using the Conduent Healthy Communities Institute Platform.
- CARES was funded through the Overdose Data to Action (OD2A) grant received by Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Division of Overdose Prevention (DOP), National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC).





External Data Overview

- Franklin County CARES is a public facing website that provides comprehensive data on addiction, recovery, and health for residents and communities in Franklin County.
- Franklin County CARES also provides resources and data-driven strategies to address several health topics including substance use and misuse.





Using External Data to Inform Decisions

- FCPH utilizes data from CARES to supplement internal data when writing grant applications and creating reports.
- Community organizations use data from CARES for grant applications or reporting.
- Indicators that are available at different geographical levels allow FCPH to visualize what neighborhoods are experiencing worse health outcomes and prioritize services.





Using External Data to Inform Decisions

- Used the Stories capability to inform the community about the Overdose Data to Action Grant and the work FCPH is doing related to overdose prevention.
- CARES features a Promising Practices Database to inform professionals and community members about documented approaches to improving community health.


