Goal

80-90 percent of Ohio's population in some value-based payment model (combination of episodes- and population-based payment) within five years


State's Role

- Shift rapidly to PCMH and episode model in Medicaid fee-for-service
- Require Medicaid MCO partners to participate and implement
- Incorporate into contracts of MCOs for state employee benefit program

Patient-centered medical homes **Episode-based payments** State leads design of five episodes: In 2014 focus on Comprehensive Year 1 asthma (acute exacerbation), Primary Care Initiative (CPCi) perinatal, COPD exacerbation, PCI, Payers agree to participate in design and joint replacement for elements where standardization Payers agree to participate in design and/or alignment is critical process, launch reporting on at least Multi-payer group begins enrollment 3 of 5 episodes in 2014 and tie to strategy for one additional market payment within year Model rolled out to all major markets 20 episodes defined and launched across Year 3 payers 50% of patients are enrolled 50+ episodes defined and launched across Scale achieved state-wide Year 5 payers 80% of patients are enrolled

CPCi Overview

The Comprehensive Primary Care (CPC) initiative is a multi-payer initiative fostering collaboration between public and private health care payers to strengthen primary care. Medicare will work with commercial and State health insurance plans and offer bonus payments to primary care doctors who better coordinate care for their patients.

OPCPCC and SIM

- OPCPCC is viewed as an important stakeholder for the PCMH component of Ohio's State Innovation Model process.
- OPCPCC members serve both on the PCMH and Episode work teams, representing perspectives of urban and rural providers, family medicine and pediatrics, employers, and consumers.
- Information regarding the SIM process and the CPCi project are shared with OPCPCC members at conferences and through the weekly updates and quarterly newsletters.
- OPCPCC Coordinating Council appoints "guest members" representing other parts of the state to attend the CPCi Multi-Stakeholder Group in SW Ohio.



OPCPCC Membership

- OPCPCC is a coalition of primary care providers, health professionals from the medical neighborhood, insurers, employers, consumer advocates, state and local government officials, and public health professionals. They are joining together to create a more effective and efficient model of health care delivery in Ohio. That model of care is the PCMH.
